It is true the design and uses are elements of these plans that may provide increased accommodations for residents, small businesses, and generate additional sales tax revenues. Establishing and adhering to design standards created specifically for Scottsdale, with resident input, will help us better control the impacts of developments such as these, and will give our residents the assurance of knowing what future developments will look like.
